Mission

The United Nations International Network of Female Police Peacekeepers was established to promote, strengthen and advance the profile of female police in international peacekeeping operations.

This network promotes the United Nations Global Effort to increase the number of female police officers in national and international police services. It raises awareness about the experience of and the need for more female police in international peacekeeping operations.

Objectives

Representation: To encourage equal representation of female police officers across all ranks and particularly in senior positions in peacekeeping operations according to the United Nations Global Effort.

Advocacy: To provide a platform to promote the contributions made by female police officers to peacekeeping operations and advocate for issues affecting them.

Professionalism: To contribute to the professionalism of the United Nations Police (UNPOL) by harnessing the specialized skills and capacity that female police officers bring to peace-keeping operations. To provide a mechanism to share experiences and expertise on international policing and issues affecting women.

Empowerment: To build opportunities for learning and development by providing information to members on existing training relevant to policing in peacekeeping operations including facilitating access if possible. To create a process for mentoring female police peacekeepers and help members become effective leaders.

Networking: To develop a network of professional contacts between officers within and across peacekeeping missions. To establish links with other national, regional and international police networks and create synergies with existing programmes.

Activities

1. Race to 2014

To advance the Global Effort of increasing the proportion of female police officers to 20 percent by 2014, Network members are encouraged:

To mobilize to reach 2,014 Network members (active, civilians, honorary and observers) by 2014.

To contribute to reaching 2,014 sign-ups on the Global Effort Facebook page' by advocating for sign-ups. The goal is to have 2,014 people who have signed-up (clicked 'Like') to the Facebook page by year 2014.

Outstanding members have the chance to be featured in the website and other public information materials.





2. Advocacy programme

Network members are encouraged to be advocates in their home country and in UN missions for the increased participation of female police to UN missions. Support materials will be provided.
