



Year in Review 2024 (including 2023)

The Peacekeeping-Intelligence Academy (PKIA)

- The PKIA was inaugurated in June 2023, and serves as a hub for all trainings related to Peacekeeping-Intelligence (PKI) organized by the United Nations (UN). The PKIA also organizes trainings related to Early Warning. It is funded through extra-budgetary funding to the amount of six million dollars over five years. The PKIA is located in the UN Regional Service Center Entebbe (RSCE) in Uganda, and comprises four staff. Trainings are being delivered in-person in Entebbe, as well as in UN peacekeeping missions. Online trainings and e-learning are also available. The following trainings were offered in 2023 and 2024:
- Open-Source PKI (OPKI)
- Human Source PKI (HPKI)
- PKI fundamentals (PKI-F)
- Geospatial PKI (GPKI)
- Military PKI (MPKI)
- Early Warning and Critical Indicators (EWCI)
- Driver Based Scenario Building (DBSB)


A new training will be added in 2025: Analytical Techniques for PKI (ATPKI)



As of 31 December 2024, the PKIA has trained 1,168 military, police and civilian personnel, including online and elearning.


2023

From June to December 2023, the PKIA delivered **five** courses, for a total of **49** military, police and civilian staff members coming from **10** Peacekeeping Missions.











2024

2024 was the first full year for the PKIA. Between January 1st and December 31st, the PKIA delivered **14** courses and trained **271** military, police and civilian colleagues in person and **260** online, from **10** Peacekeeping mission. In addition, **582** individuals from all over the world completed the available PKI e-learning courses. Two new in-person trainings were developed in 2024: Geospatial PKI (GPKI) and Analytical techniques for PKI (ATPKI), and two new self-paced courses were released (PKI Fundamentals and Peacekeeping-Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance – PKISR orientation path).









In-Mission Trainings (IMT)

In 2024, seven trainings were delivered in Peacekeeping Missions: two in UNISFA, two in UNMISS and three in MINUSCA. The MPKI trainings in UNMISS and MINUSCA were organized in cooperation with the Light Coordination Mechanism (DPET/ITS/LCM).

IMT UNISFA

Two courses were delivered in UNISFA in July 2024, at the end of which, **42 participants** were trained on several structured analytical techniques to conduct forward-looking analysis and to methodologically identify and monitor critical indicators, including through the generation of relevant drivers and the monitoring of their evolution.

IMT UNMISS

Upon request from UNMISS, the PKIA conducted trainings on Peacekeeping-Intelligence Fundamentals (PKI-F) and Military Peacekeeping-Intelligence (MPKI) for a total number of **54 colleagues** from PKI core entities (Force, Police, JMAC, JOC, DSS), as well as substantive sections, including the Gender Affairs Unit and Human Rights Section.

Colleagues from UNMISS participated in hands-on trainings with the aim to learn about PKI good practices, processes, and their role within it. The feedback provided after the trainings demonstrated a positive impact on the participants' knowledge and confidence level of PKI after the trainings.



The MPKI course was delivered in partnership with the Tunited Kingdom.





IMT MINUSCA

Following the Action plan for Enhancement of MINUSCA Peacekeeping-Intelligence and Early Warning Capacity, the PKIA was

asked to develop a training programme to address several training needs expressed by the Mission.

Within a two-week timeframe, the PKIA delivered three tailored trainings. As part of outreach to more remote areas in the Mission Area of Responsibility, the PKIA trainers traveled to Bouar to deliver the PKI Fundamentals training *in-situ*.

A total of 335 MINUSCA colleagues were trained in PKI Fundamentals, MPKI and OPKI (125 in person and 260 online).

The MPKI course was delivered in partnership with the Netherlands.



E-learning

In 2024, two self-paced courses were developed in partnership with the United Nations System Staff College (UNSSC) and are now available online: the Peacekeeping-Intelligence Fundamentals course (developed by the PKIA), and the Peacekeeping-Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance (PKISR) Orientation Path (developed by the Assessment Team/ Office of Military Affairs). These two courses are available for both UN and non-UN audiences. **As of 31 December 2024, a combined total of 582 individuals had completed at least one of the courses.** The PKIA is currently working on an e-learning version of the MPKI course.

Member States Donors and Partners

The creation of the PKIA was made possible thanks to the financial support of Denmark, Germany, Japan, The Netherlands, Norway and Sweden, which altogether committed to fund the Academy until 2028.
