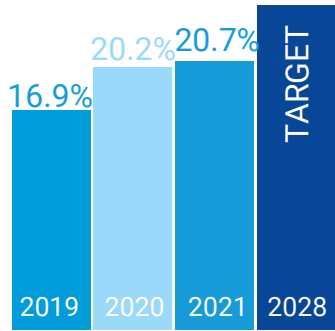
The UN Security Council (2242) called for doubling the number of women in uniformed components of peace operations by 2028. Currently, only 7.8% of all uniformed military, police and justice and corrections personnel in field missions are women. Even though remarkable progress has been achieved since the adoption of the Uniformed Gender Parity Strategy, efforts are still needed to reach our targets for 2028 and beyond and sustain those that have been met.

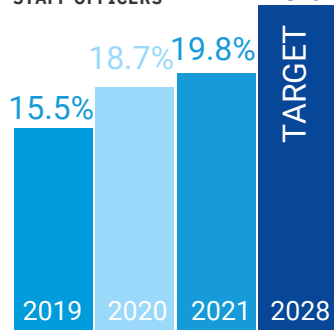

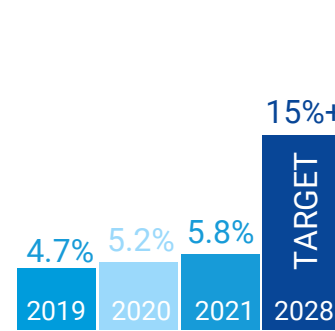
PROFESSIONAL POSTS AT HQ 25%+



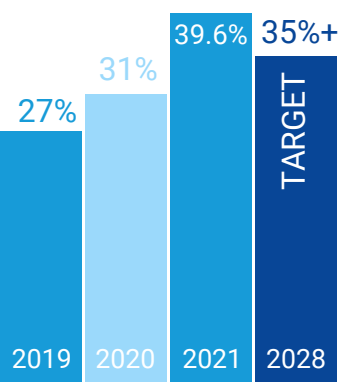
MILITARY OBSERVERS & STAFF OFFICERS 25%+



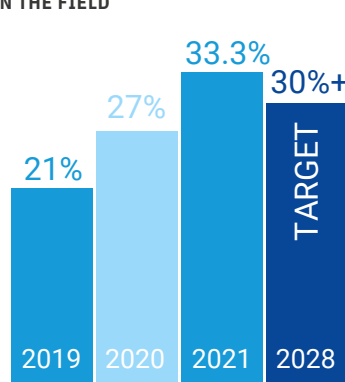

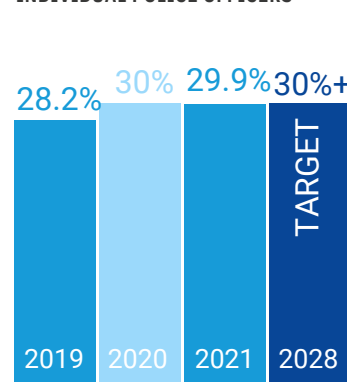

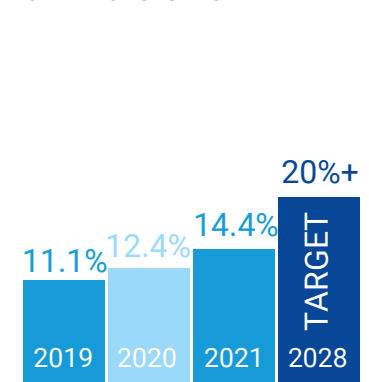
PROFESSIONAL POSTS IN THE FIELD



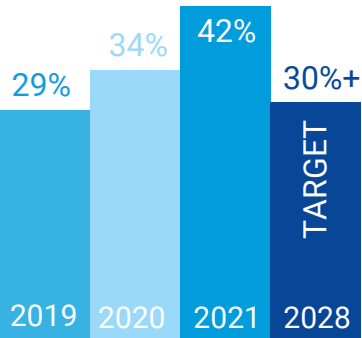
